## **Unitarian Universalist Church Continues Decades-Long Tradition of Giving**

Each year, folks at the Unitarian Universalist Church get together and gather food for the holidays. The food isn't for them, of course, it's to make sure families who might not otherwise have a Christmas dinner aren't without. The church's Hunger Task Force begins at the pulpit one Sunday, announcing MCUM's food basket initiative and the church's goal for the season.

In the following weeks, the food really starts coming in. Mary Blizzard has been working with church for more than 10 years, helping other church members create and organize food baskets with the items they donate.

"Part of why we give to MCUM is because it's tradition, and part of it is because we really respect the work that MCUM does," she said.

Last year, the UU church collected enough food to make 90 baskets, a congregation record. Blizzard said that while the economy makes people feel insecure and she knows donating 90 baskets two years in a row would be tough to do, "we get a lot of satisfaction from feeding people."

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### **Long-time donor Harv Hagerty: MCUM's impact has been "dramatic"**

"I hope MCUM will continue to provide the services they do now at the quality and compassion level that has always been hallmark of MCUM. I have a long history of seeing MCUM make a significant difference in people's lives."
