- Alex Dowland, ACE Program Intern

For IU freshman Alex Dowland, choosing to work for MCUM ended up changing his life plans. Dowland is studying Business Management, and said before he came to MCUM, he imagined himself as an eventual company CEO. But since he started here, his dreams shifted from the for-profit sector to the non-profit sector.

How to hold a successful food drive

Okay, so you want to help out this holiday season by collecting food for MCUM. Easy, right? You know lots of good people who’d love to help the hungry so you want to hold a food drive. It’s a wonderful idea --- but here are a few tips to make sure you can maximize the results.

1. **Set a goal.** The best food drives are ones that involve numeric goals - pounds of food donated, percentage of people who participated, etc. A little friendly competition goes a long way!
2. **Set a date.** If you’re trying to hold a food drive at your church, scheduling it on date where people will be getting together can maximize the amount of people who contribute to the drive.
3. **Set standards.** We’ll take as much as we can use, but there are some items that work better than others. Non-perishable items are ideal - think canned foods, household chemicals, shampoo, soap, etc.
